Story Background

Ti-Fam: Witch Doctor's Daughter is a missionary story from Haiti and is based on fact. This mountainous country is on the western end of the island of Hispaniola in the Caribbean. French is spoken there by city dwellers, but the common people use Creole, a French dialect intermingled with African, Spanish and English words.

Several years ago this little country was plagued with catastrophes. Hurricane Hazel caused severe damage, including a landslide in which everyone in a valley area was killed, except one girl. Months of drought followed, causing starvation. Then the first frost in Haiti's history came and destroyed the early corn crop.

The description of missionary life and methods, including the rescue and relief work, is based on the experiences of actual missionaries. Ti-Fam was the daughter of mountain people. Her father, a witch doctor, led in voodoo worship involving magic and charms, worship of evil spirits and spirit possession.

This missions lesson tells how the Gospel of Christ overcame the demonism that enslaved the people. As you tell the story both you and the boys and girls will become better acquainted with voodoo customs and how to witness to those held in their power.



Raise your hand if you've heard of the country of Haiti. (Allow response.) What can you tell me about it? (Allow response.) This week we will be hearing a story that takes place in Haiti about a girl named Ti-Fam.

Flashcard 1

The sun was coming up over the mountains in Haiti. Ti-Fam rolled up the banana leaf mat that was her bed. She carried it out into the sun and set it against the side of her two-room mud house.

"Ti-Fam!" called Madame Orestil, Ti-Fam's mother. "We must dig up the rest of the sweet potatoes for market tomorrow. Go cut banana leaves to line the baskets."

Getting banana leaves and digging up sweet potatoes is hard work. How do you think Ti-Fam felt? (Allow response.) She was excited because she remembered Mama's promise: If they earned enough money selling sweet potatoes, she could have a new dress! Ti-Fam picked up her big knife and ran to the banana trees.

Flashcard 2

"Ti-Fam!" a quiet voice called. A girl about her age walked toward her.

"Oh, Marie, guess what I'm going to get! A new dress with words on it!"

Marie was confused. "Words? You won't be able to read them, Ti-Fam. But I'm going to learn to read."

"Really? Will you teach me?"

"Yes," said Marie. "My family's going to get something new too."

"Let me guess—a new voodoo charm from my father?"

Marie shook her head. "We're not going to buy any more voodoo charms."

Ti-Fam clutched the garlic fetish charm hanging around her neck. "Not buy any more voodoo charms?" she gasped. "Maybe your house will burn down! Maybe you'll get sick! Marie, aren't you afraid?"

"No," Marie said confidently. "We're Christians now. We're trusting the Lord Jesus to take care of us, just like Victor said."

"Don't believe him! He tells lies!"

"No, he doesn't. The missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Turnbull, taught Victor the truth from God's book, the Bible," Marie said quietly. "After market we're going to buy a Bible at the mission station."

"No, don't go to the mission station! One day you might need my father's voodoo. He won't help you if you believe in the missionaries' God!"

Marie shook her head. "Jesus is stronger than your father's voodoo."

Ti-Fam ran to her mother, who was standing beside the baskets of sweet potatoes. "Mama! Mama! Marie's family won't buy any more voodoo charms! They're Christians!"

Flashcard 3

Early the next morning Ti-Fam balanced a basket full of sweet potatoes on her head.

"Come, come! We must get to market," her mother said as she picked up the other basket.

Why hurry, thought Ti-Fam as she watched her father go toward his voodoo temple (the place where he did magic and worshipped evil spirits). He looked fierce in his red shirt. Ti-Fam trembled. What magic would he do today? Would he make the evil spirits do something awful to Marie's family because they believed in the missionaries' God?

"Go along," said Madame Orestil, pushing Ti-Fam ahead of her.

Flashcard 4

They started up the mountain trail that led out of the valley. Imagine what it would be like to walk up a steep mountain trail while balancing a basket of potatoes on your head! Let's all stand up and pretend to balance a basket on our heads while walking in place. (Allow response.) Good job. You may all sit down.

When they reached the highest point, Ti-Fam looked back. The house farthest away was Marie's. *Would the spirits burn her house?* Ti-Fam worried. Frightened, Ti-Fam ran to catch up with her mother then looked at her in surprise.

"Mama, stop! Your charm is lost!"

"No," her mother, Madame Orestil, said. "The string broke this morning and I left it off. Nothing will happen."

"Oh yes, it will!" Ti-Fam cried holding her own charm tightly in her hand.

Do you think something will happen to Madame Orestil because she isn't wearing her voodoo charm? (Allow response.)

At the market Ti-Fam and her mother stopped in front of a man buying and selling sweet potatoes. Madame Orestil put both baskets in front of him.

The man pushed aside the banana leaves in the larger basket and looked at the sweet potatoes carefully. Suddenly he dumped them on the ground.

"Worms, nothing but worms! I will only give you 35 cents," he said.

Ti-Fam's mother took the money and picked up the empty basket and Ti-Fam's basket, which was still full. She led Ti-Fam to an open place and set the baskets down. "Sit here. I will go buy some beans and sugar. Then we will try to sell the sweet potatoes that are left."

Ti-Fam sat down by the baskets.

"Are your sweet potatoes for sale?" asked a strong voice.

"Y-yes," Ti-Fam looked up at the smiling man. "One dollar and twenty-five cents."

"That is too much," he grinned. "But I need them for Granny Holdeman today, so I will pay you 35 cents."

Ti-Fam saw her mother coming. "Mama, look!" Ti-Fam opened her hand. "See, 40 cents!"

"Ah-la-la. Maybe now you'll have your dress!"

Ti-Fam pulled her mother to a stall where dresses made of cloth feed sacks were hanging. She pointed to one with English words.

Flashcard 6

"It is 75 cents," said the old man.

"I do not have 75 cents," said Madame Orestil. "I will give you 20 cents."

"Well," the man shrugged, "50 cents and not a penny cheaper!"

"Make it 30 cents and I will take it. See how my little daughter needs a new dress!"

"Never!" The man put the dress back on the rack.

Ti-Fam's eyes filled with tears. "See what you have done. You have broken her heart," Madame Orestil said with anger. She took the 40 cents from Ti-Fam and held it before him. "Take all the money we have."

The man put the 40 cents in his pocket and gave the dress to Ti-Fam. She dropped her basket and hugged the dress in her arms.

Just then Ti-Fam heard a soft voice. It was Marie!

"Come see! Victor is here to tell a story!"

Victor! Ti-Fam trembled. Marie started toward the large group of children. In front of them Ti-Fam saw a tall man with a black book under his arm.

"Mama," she gasped. "It's the man who bought my sweet potatoes! He is Victor!"

Flashcard 7

Victor began to speak. Ti-Fam put her dress in her basket then covered her ears with her hands.

"I won't listen, Mama,"

Madame Orestil nodded but she did not cover her ears. "But I will look," said Ti-Fam carefully. "I like him a

little because he bought my sweet potatoes."

Do you think that Ti-Fam could still hear Victor even though she was covering her ears? Everyone cover your ears. (Allow response.) Can you still hear my voice? (Allow response.) You can take your hands off your ears now.

Ti-Fam heard the words dimly. "Many years ago a wicked king and his people worshipped a false god named Baal. A prophet named Elijah worshipped the true God. Elijah said he would have a contest to show which god was true."

Ti-Fam watched Victor put pictures on a large, flat board. She wondered what made them stick. Did Victor have magic of his own? She let her hands slip from her ears.

"The men who served Baal killed a bull and placed it on their altar as a gift to their god. There were 450 of these prophets. They were something like witch doctors!" said Victor. "All day long they called to their god to send fire. They shouted and danced around the altar and even cut themselves! But nothing happened."

When the witch doctor came out, he held up a rag doll he had made out of Ti-Fam's new dress. "See, this voodoo doll is Victor and these pins are stuck into his heart. These two nails will fix the spell and make it hold. And this black thread is a warning that Victor will die!"


Ti-Fam stood still, scarcely daring to breathe. She had never seen her father put a death curse on someone before.

Suddenly Ti-Fam started to slip. Turning to catch her, Madame Orestil hit her foot against a sharp rock, ripping her shoe and cutting her toe. She gasped in pain and sank down beside the path.

Ti-Fam put her arms around her. "Mama, dear Mama!" she cried. "I should have given you my charm!"

"I would have slipped anyway, my dear. Are we close to the mission?"

"Oh, Mama! We can't go there! The spirits will be angry and Papa won't like it."

"We must go," said Madame Orestil. "The wind and rain are strong. We may have to stay overnight."

"Mama, please don't!" Ti-Fam begged. But her mother started toward the mission. Ti-Fam followed, clutching her charm.

Flashcard 10

Madame Orestil spoke. "We heard your story. I liked what you said about your God. But when I told my husband, Orestil the witch doctor, he put a voodoo death curse on you."

"You will die," said Ti-Fam trembling, "and we shouldn't be here, but Mama hurt her toe."

"Let me see." Victor knelt and looked at the sore toe. He got up and went to the door. "I'll get Granny Holdeman. She'll take care of you."

Victor ran out into the pouring rain.

"Little girl," said Granny, "while I fix your Mama's foot you may read out loud from that Bible on the shelf."

"It tells a wonderful story, dear. It tells about a man who loved and helped people. This man spoke and healed a little boy with a high fever. He made lame people walk and blind people see."

"I don't believe it. My papa, the witch doctor, can't do that."

"Tell me about Him," said Madame Orestil, leaning forward.

Flashcard 12

"If we go quickly, I think we can make it." Madame Orestil stepped in as Ti-Fam clung to her hand. The current in the river was very strong. It must have been hard to walk through it. Everyone stand up and pretend you're trying to walk through a river with a strong current. (*Allow response.*) Okay, you may sit down.

The wind blew stronger as they reached the other side.

"Oh, Mama, you've lost your bandage." Her mother didn't answer but limped on as fast as she could. When Orestil saw them coming, he opened the door and helped them inside.

Flashcard 13

"Dear Papa, please stop the storm," cried Ti-Fam. "I

will never go to the mission again!"

Orestil's eyes flashed. "The mission! You went to the mission?" He pounded his chest and shouted, "I am Orestil the witch doctor! You both have angered the spirits too much. There is no stopping them now."

Ti-Fam looked down at her garlic charm. Wouldn't it

help her at all?

"Papa," Ti-Fam pleaded, "you haven't looked at Mama's foot. Oh, look how swollen it is!"

Flashcard 14

Orestil looked down at his wife. His anger was gone. "Dear Mama, how can I help you? You will not wear your voodoo charm."

"Maybe I find it never works," Madame Orestil said slowly.

They were all silent.

The wind howled about the hut and the rain kept

pouring down.

On the third day someone pounded on the door. Who do you think it was? (Allow response.)

Flashcard 15

It was Victor!

"Why did you come?" Orestil growled.

"Please listen," Victor said. "The rain has loosened the rocks on the mountain. A landslide is coming. You must leave."

"Fool," Orestil sneered. "The spirits will protect us!"

"Orestil, the spirits can't help you. God is the only one who can. He loves us. No matter what happens, I know that. You can know His love too."

"Let him tell us how," Madame Orestil begged. "After all, he came through the storm to warn us."

"All right," Orestil agreed.

"The one true God," said Victor, "is greater than all spirits. He made everything and He is a God of love."

"Love," Madame Orestil repeated.

"Yes," Victor nodded. "God loves you. He does not want you to fear evil spirits. He wants you to fear being separated from Him because of your sin."

"Sin," Orestil muttered. "Who are you to speak of sin

to me?"

"I have sinned too," said Victor. "God's Word says, 'All have sinned' (Romans 3:23) but God the Son, the Lord Jesus, died on the cross for all our sin and came back to life on the third day. Orestil looked at his wife with anger. Then he turned and went out into the howling wind and pouring rain.


"Victor is wrong to talk against Papa and the spirits," sobbed Ti-Fam. "But I don't want Papa to kill him!"

Flashcard 17

Orestil clutched his witch doctor necklace, trusting it to give him luck.

Lightning flashed and Orestil saw Victor. He was headed straight toward the edge of a big cliff. Good, thought Orestil. He will fall over the cliff and no one will ever find him!

Suddenly Orestil stepped into a deep hole. He groaned with pain as his other leg twisted beneath him. *The spirits must be angry*, he thought.

Suddenly he heard a voice. It was Victor!

"Help me," Orestil groaned in pain. "I—I decided we should go to Marie's because the water was coming in faster," Orestil said. "I was coming for your help and stepped into this hole and twisted my leg. Just help me get to that new hut by the big rocks and I'll be all right."

Was Orestil really going for Victor's help? (No.) What was he trying to do? (Kill Victor.)

Flashcard 18

Victor slowly and carefully pulled Orestil to his feet. "I do this in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ," Victor said.

Victor helped the witch doctor into the new hut out of the wind and rain.

"Orestil, it is true what I told you," Victor said. "There is great danger in the valley. The top of the mountain may come down any moment. Your house will be covered by dirt and rocks. Almost everyone has believed my warning. They have gone where they will be safe but Madame Orestil and Ti-Fam are not safe. Let me go and bring them here."

"No! The mountain can't fall on my house. I have pleased the voodoo spirits. They are showing their anger now with this storm because my wife has turned her back on them, but they won't let the mountain kill her."

Just then they heard a deep rumbling sound.

Everyone stand up. We're going to make a rumbling sound with our feet. Start stomping softly. Now a little louder! (*Allow response*).

The mountain was falling! Stomp as loud as you can then when I lower my hands, sit back down. (Allow brief response then lower your hands.)

Orestil screamed. "My wife! My little Ti-Fam! We must go! You must help me!"

After a long, long time the awful sound stopped. Rocks and dirt filled most of the valley.





- God loves you.
- The Bible says, "God so loved the world" (John 3:16).



The child's problem—his condition before God as a sinner

- Sin is anything you think, say or do that displeases God.
- You were born with a "want to" to do things your own way.
- You sin by (give examples on an age-appropriate level).
- The Bible says, "All have sinned" (Romans 3:23).
- The punishment God gives for sin is death (separation from God forever).



God's solution—forgiveness of sin through Jesus Christ

- · Jesus is God the Son.
- Jesus never sinned.
- Jesus willingly bled and died on the cross to take the punishment God gave Him for sin.
- The Bible says, "The blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).
- Jesus died and on the third day came back to life (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).
- Jesus is now in Heaven.



Invitation to trust Christ as Savior

- Tell God you're sorry for your sin.
- Tell God you believe in (trust) the Lord Jesus Christ, who died for your sin.
- Tell God you want to live His way.
- The Bible says, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). (Read this condition/promise verse or another such as Acts 16:31 or John 1:12. [A condition/promise verse gives a condition that must be met for God to fulfill a certain promise. In John 3:16 the condition is belief in Jesus and the promise is everlasting life.] Tell the children when and where they can talk with you during the next activity about trusting Christ.)



Emphasis for the saved child

 An application from the lesson with a corresponding verse to help saved children grow in their relationship with the Lord.

Key Questions

Why did you come to talk with me? Why do you need the Lord Jesus Christ?

The True and Living God (John 3:16a)

- Who is God?
- What does it mean that God is holy?
- · Does God love you?

Need of Salvation (Romans 3:23)

- What is sin?
- · Are you a sinner?
- What is God's punishment for sin?

Way of Salvation (1 Corinthians 15:3-5a)

- Who is Jesus?
- · What did the Lord Jesus do for you?
- Why is Jesus the only one who could die for your sins?
- What happened to Jesus after He died?

Believe in Jesus

- Let's look in the Bible to see what God says about believing in Jesus. (Use a condition/promise verse such as John 1:12; John 3:16 or Acts 16:31 and the terminology used in the verse you choose; e.g., believe in, believe on, receive, etc.)
- What does God promise He will do?
- What does God say you must do?
- Do you believe in the Lord Jesus as the only Savior from your sins?

Suggested Prayer of Response

- Tell God that you have sinned and that you are sorry.
- Tell God you believe in (trust) the Lord Jesus Christ, who died for your sin and rose again.
- Tell God you want to live His way with His help.

Assurance

- If you truly believe in the Lord Jesus, what did He do for you?
- How do you know? (Read the condition/promise verse again. Put child's name in it.)
- The Bible says that Jesus comes into your life when you believe in Him. Jesus will never leave you! (Read Hebrews 13:5.) Where is Jesus now?
- (Read Hebrews 13:6.) Who will help you say NO to sin?
- If you do sin, what should you do? Let's look and see what God's Word says. (Read and explain 1 John 1:9.)

Grow (2 Peter 3:18)

- **G**—**Go** to church and Sunday school.
- R-Read God's Word and pray every day.
- **O—Obey** God! God, the Holy Spirit, lives in you to give you the power to help you do what is right. (*Read Hebrews 13:5-6.*)
- W—Witness to others, telling them about what the Lord Jesus has done for them.

Before the child leaves, give him or her a tract. Encourage him to talk to God right now:

- Thank God for loving you and saving you from sin.
- · Thank God for helping you live for Him.

Pray for the child by name.
